

The cricket season has come to an end. As always, it's been an interesting season for very different reasons for each of the adult teams, the women's team and the colts and a précis of each of these teams is to be found below.

As a cricket committee, we would like to start by thanking everyone who has been involved with Roffey Cricket Club this year. The club would not run without the hard work of the management committee, the bar staff, the cleaner, the scorers, the sponsors, the umpires, the groundsman, the coaches, the captains, the parents and guardians, the families, anyone that has helped on the workdays and of course, all of the players. The success of the club is entirely dependent on individuals coming together for the benefit of the club. The old idiom that the club is greater than the sum of its parts, is entirely correct and we are a great club. We need to keep pushing to maintain this.

# 1<sup>st</sup> XI

It was an inconsistent season for the 1<sup>st</sup> XI, we had some excellent performances, particularly at home, beating both the top two sides in the league. However, we also had some bad losses against sides we would expect to beat. As a young side, I think it was always going to be a tough season, the ups and downs were expected but it was promising to see some big contributions from some of our younger players – particular highlights were Shams' 100\* at East Grinstead and Toby Munt finishing as our leading wicket taker in the league. I think our 7<sup>th</sup> place finish is indicative of where we are as a team at the moment, hopefully we can bring in some players in the winter to help strengthen the side to allow us to compete at the other end of the table.

On a personal note, a big thank you to everybody at the Club that has supported me during my tenure as captain, it has always been a huge honour to captain the 1<sup>st</sup> XI. I have no doubt that it is the right time to step away; a new captain with fresh ideas is exactly what we need to progress in the coming years.

## 2<sup>nd</sup> XI

At the start of the season, I knew we had a good enough side to compete in the league. It was just about getting the right blend of experience to mix with the potential of the younger members of the squad.

The first half of the season was basically about us being 20/3 either setting or chasing, with the lower middle order combining to get us over the line or try and set a target to defend. We won more games than we lost and the games we lost we knew where we needed to improve.

One stand out finish from a game early in the first half was the taking victory from the jaws of defeat of Steyning at home. After being 15/3 we were able to post a respectable but slight under par 206 all out. Steyning were cruising at 141-2, then 197-3 after 41.2 – so with 22 balls left 10 to win 3 down, winviz would have had our chances at 1%, we end up winning by 3 runs – with them only scoring 7 off 22 balls losing 3 wickets more wickets! Half way through we were mid table and had 5 wins from 9. With no expectations to finish much higher than that. But we had a mini clear out and changed a few roles in the side and it was either that or learning from the first half of the season, the top order started to find a bit of form and the runs started flowing and we started asking a few more questions of the opposition opening bowlers. We went on a run of 5 unbeaten from halfway that took us to within 2 points of top with 2 games to go. The penultimate game at home to Findon, who were top.... We won the toss and bowled first, which seemed to be the right decision after they were 65-4, and we continued to take wickets bowling them out for 139 in 39 overs. We lost an early wicket but a 50 partnership between Alex Southon and Josh Gander, seemed to settle the nerves, but losing them both in quick succession, it was down to Pav and Tom Barnes with a 43-run partnership to see us home with 4 overs spare, 6 down.

Then with on the final day with rain around and following the confirmation we couldn't be caught by Billingshurst, after they were cancelled. We were shaking hands at Goring knowing that we were league champions! Then we began having the first of many celebratory beers from about 12.15! It was a good thing we got there early for breakfast and a swim!

A quick note to thank all my 'volunteers' that continue to provide the best home teas in Sussex and to Emma for once again scoring for us all season. Division 2 here we come!

# 3<sup>rd</sup> XI

A special mention to Monty Boniface who stepped up from the U13s to help us and bowled magnificently every time he played. One for the future!

## Sunday XI
